DIRECTOR'S INTRODUCTION

Some shows are just plain easy.

The set is easy, the casting's simple, the rehearsal process smooth and untroubling, finding the costumes and props a breeze, and nothing heavier than a hiccup happens... And it sells like hotcakes. But who wants *that*?!?

Some people may be sitting in the auditorium now, reading this, and worried that they're about to sit through <u>four-and-a-half hours</u> of indecipherable gibberish, delivered by *ak-torrrs* in frilly shirts with plums in their mouths... Good. Some people may be wishing they'd brought a pillow, a book, a TV, an iPod, dear God, *anything* that'll distract them from the surely-impending boredom of this slow, confusing and depressing show... Good.

And a few more may be wanting to enjoy seeing their partner/ friend/ colleague/ family member/household pet?/whatever dressed in tights and panic-spouting words they can barely pronounce, never mind understand... Good. Because these people have the chance to go through the same

thing that my thirteen-year-old self went through. A surprise.

No, it's you unlucky learned few, who know the show backwards and have sections of it memorised as a way of impressing people at dinner parties that I worry for. For a start, you won't be going on the rollercoaster ride of emotions like the un-jaded up-for-it newbies will. You're not going to be meeting anew the soap-opera-like dysfunctional families and the quirky characters. You won't have the chance to see that story *for the first time*.

Can you even remember back to the first time you saw it? Or any Shakespeare, for that matter...? Some school trip, dragged kicking and screaming like scholastic hostages, that odd immersion into a world where everyone speaks differently, and then maybe... that one scene... that one phrase... that one performance that held your attention and made you forget all your fears...?

And suddenly Shakespeare needn't be the nightmare that you thought it was going to be... It's like a jigsaw where you suddenly got an edge and the puzzle's looking solvable! They talk funny... there's loads of Kings and Princes and whatnot... but *they're just like <u>us</u>!!*

So, what do you need to know ...?

Okay, Old King Hamlet of Denmark (who has a *son* called Hamlet, confusingly enough) has been bashing and conquering neighbouring Kingdoms, and finally picks a fight with Old King Fortinbras of Norway (who has *also* called his son Fortinbras! What is it with Kings and unimaginative names?!?)

They decide to make the battle a fair fight for the land and Old Hamlet wins, killing Old Fortinbras. But then a few days later, in the midst of victory, Old Hamlet dies from a snake-bite whilst sleeping in his orchard.

But, rumour has it that new Prime Minister, Polonius, has leaked to the press that – despite being of age to rule – it won't be *young* Hamlet who takes the throne, but Old Hamlet's brother, Claudius! And Old Hamlet's Queen, Gertrude, is gearing up to *marry* Claudius, (her *brother in-law*!) There's talk of a war brewing in Norway... And rumour has it that there have been many strange occurrences around Castle Elsinore odd lights....strange sounds....spectral figures.... *Something* is rotten in the state of Denmark!
